- 3. Has connecting with your heavenly Father ever cost you something that was important to you? How difficult was it to let go of whatever it was? Was it worth the sacrifice? Why or why not?
- 4. Is it difficult for you to believe that you belong to God and he has a plan for you? Why or why not?
- 5. Read Revelation 3:19–20. Has God ever disciplined you in order to bring you back to him? If so, how did you respond?
- 6. In what area of your life do you need to tell God, "Your will, not my will?" What is one thing you can do to begin to surrender to your heavenly Father in that area? What can this group do to support you?
